No interference with our 146.88 has been observed. Also pointed out, potential GOTA operators on Field Day may get some on the air experience in the upcoming Indiana QSO Party, May 7. REMINDER: INDIANA QSO PARTY (INQP) MAY 7 – Remember, the Indiana QSO Party (INQP) is May 7th from 11AM until 11PM. The INQP is a casual contest with stations outside of Indiana trying to work all the Indiana counties.

Stations in Indiana to work as many stations as possible and including other Indiana counties.

You can operate on 80M, 40M, 20M, 15M, and 10M, both CW and SSB (no FT8).

40M is likely to be the most popular band, with 20M during the day and 80M at night.

Since I also do the Mini-Marathon, I don't get on till about 3PM checking out 20M and 40M and in the evening 40M and 80M.

So far this year 10M and 15m band conditions have been very good, check out those bands. Techs can only operate on 10M SSB

Dayton Hamvention[®] is offering a free mobile app for smartphones and tablets to help attendees navigate the large-scale event, which runs May 20 - 22 at the Greene County Fairgrounds and Expo Center in Xenia, Ohio. The app, which was introduced in 2019, is offered in a collaborative effort with ARRL The National Association for Amateur Radio[®].

The free ARRL Events app is now available and already includes Hamvention's full program, so attendees can browse and schedule forums, find affiliated events, and preview the extensive list of exhibitors. During the event, attendees can use other app features to follow the hourly prize drawings populated by the Dayton Hamvention Prize Committee, and browse building and site maps.

Attendees are also encouraged to tap on the MyProfile icon in the app to add their name and call sign, email address, and any additional information they would like to share with other Hamvention guests. Additionally, the MyBadge icon displays a QR code of your event badge that can be scanned by another attendee or exhibitor using the Scan Badge icon – instantly connecting shared contact information with other hams at the event.

ARRL YOUTH LICENSING GRANT PROGRAM

The ARRL Youth Licensing Grant Program, in effect since April 19, 2022, will cover the one-time \$35 application fee for new amateur radio license candidates younger than 18 years old for tests

administered under the ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (VEC) program. "We are thrilled that we are able to provide this opportunity to our youth candidates," said ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM.

The \$35 Federal Communications Commission (FCC) application fee will be reimbursed after the ARRL VEC receives the completed reimbursement form and after the new license has been issued. The reimbursement check will be mailed to the fee payer. Also, candidates younger than 18 years old would pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the ARRL VEC team at the time of the exam. The \$5 fee is for all candidates under the age of 18, regardless of the exam level taken. Proof of under 18 status is required at the session.

The ARRL Board approved the Youth Licensing Grant Program at its July 2021 meeting in Hartford, Connecticut, expanding on the scope of the original motion proposed by ARRL Southeastern Division Director Mickey Baker, N4MB.

The Board believes the recruitment and training of young amateur radio operators is a necessary and proper mission of the ARRL and subsidization of the \$35 fee will reduce the number of new amateurs that would otherwise be lost from these groups. Initially the new program would serve up to 1,000 new license applicants under 18 years old. The program length is indefinite; it may be renewed or terminated by the Administration and Finance Committee or by the Board of Directors.

CANADA'S ISED HAS GRANTED HAMS THE RIGHT TO USE SPECIAL CALL SIGNS IN HONOR OF QUEEN ELIZABETH II'S PLATINUM JUBILEE

In honor of Queen Elizabeth II's 70 years on the throne (her Platinum Jubilee), Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED) has approved the use of special call signs for Canadian hams from May 15 to July 14, 2022. These dates correspond with the busy early summer operating season and will be available to all Canadian amateurs who wish to use the special call signs on all occasions, including ARRL Field Day, the June VHF Contest, the RAC Canada Day Contest, and the IARU World Championship. TUBE SHORTAGE

With massive sanctions in effect against Russia due to the war in Ukraine, the supply of vacuum tubes is dwindling fast.

To the average person, a vacuum tube is something of a piece of obsolete technology. Amateur radio operators and guitar players view the vacuum tube with considerably more reverence.

For hams the RF tubes like the 3-500Z, 572B and the 811 have been the standard for high power RF amps for years, but are no longer made in the USA.

For the audiophiles who spend thousands of dollars on home hi-fi gear, a good portion of which is tube-based. You can even buy a CD player with tube-based circuitry.

The vast majority of vacuum tubes are made overseas in China, Russia and Slovakia. A significant number of tubes manufactured by Electro-Harmonix and imported into the United States are made in Russia (EH's sub brands include Sovtek, Mullard, EH Gold, Gold Lion, Tung-Sol and Svetlana).

U.S.-based manufacturers of vacuum tubes for audio applications can be counted on one hand. Scratch that, one finger: Western Electric, still manufacturing tubes in Rossville, GA. (Editor's

note: A company called RCH Labs was established in 2012 in Carson City, NV, briefly flirted with tube production, and folded in 2016).

The pandemic has already made it hard to find the common tubes like the 811, 572b and the 3-500z and it does not look like it is going to get any better soon.

RF power Transistors and FETs are not much better with the recent COCID-19 shut down of China.

USA ARDF CHAMPIONSHIPS RESULTS

The results are in for the 21st USA Championships in Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ARDF). The 4 days of competitions were held from April 7 - 10 in Prince William Forest Park (PWFP) in northern Virginia. The competition results will help determine the makeup of ARDF Team USA at the 20th ARDF World Championships, set for September 2022 in Serbia.

Thirty participants competed in categories for men and women ranging in age from 15 to 70+. All the competitive events were held within PWFP, on maps provided by the Quantico Orienteering Club (QOC) of Quantico, Virginia. In an innovative approach, the Backwoods Orienteering Klub (BOK) of Raleigh, North Carolina, organized and sponsored the event across state lines, applying the Raleigh group's ARDF knowledge and experience to a beautiful new venue.

After a day of practice, the races began on April 7, with the fast-paced sprint event in which two sets of five transmitters operating on two different 80-meter frequencies transmit sequentially in 12-second bursts every minute. "The course was hillier than typical for this event. Nevertheless, none of the finishers exceeded the 60-minute time limit," noted Event Director Joseph Huberman, K5JGH.

Other events included:

Foxoring -- This event followed the next day. Foxoring is a timed race in which individual competitors use a topographic map and a magnetic compass to navigate through diverse, wooded terrain while searching for radio transmitters (foxes).

2-Meter Classic -- This involves locating up to five transmitters on courses of up to 12 kilometers in length. Course lengths and the number of foxes are adjusted for different age and gender categories, so that men, women, youth, and seniors, can traverse courses designed to be appropriate for their capabilities.

80-Meter Classic -- This is conducted much like the 2-Meter Classic, but without the reflections and multipath propagation that are often observed at VHF frequencies.

US competitors in the six International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) categories for men aged 19 - 70 and women aged 19 - 65, are under consideration for membership in the US team for the 2022 ARDF Championships. Up to three competitors in each age and gender category and competition format may be on a national team.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, GERMANY TO HOST THE 45TH INTERNATIONAL AMATEUR RADIO EXHIBITION

After a 2-year break, amateur radio fans will reunite on Lake Constance in Friedrichshafen, Germany, from June 24 - 26, 2022, for HAM RADIO -- the 45th International Amateur Radio Exhibition.

Planning for Europe's largest amateur radio exhibition is under way, and this year's theme is "Seeing Friends Again." While amateurs were able to stay connected during the COVID-19

pandemic, Deutscher Amateur Radio Club (DARC) Chairman Christian Entsfellner, DL3MBG, said, "This is exactly what we have been missing over the past 2 years." He further explained, "Despite all the difficulties, this demonstrates how valuable and helpful the amateur radio operator community is. It is high time for personal contact again -- with due attention to the safety of each individual, of course."

Project Manager Petra Rathgeber added, "Together with our exhibitors and partners, we are looking forward to a long-awaited get-together with the international amateur radio industry."

ARRL The National Association for Amateur Radio[®] will be among the participating International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) member-societies exhibiting at the convention. The contingent representing ARRL to greet international visitors and to network with representatives of other national ham radio societies will include ARRL President Rick Roderick, K5UR; CEO David Minster, NA2AA; Director of Operations Bob Naumann, W5OV, and Director of Public Relations and Innovation Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R. ARRL will offer DXCC card checking at its stand -- a service that's very popular within the international ham radio community.

FCC NOT PROCESSING NEW LICENSE APPLICATIONS

On Wednesday, April 27, in a notice to all VECs, the FCC again asked them to refrain from submitting any amateur radio exam session or license application files while the Commission works to resolve an issue with the Universal Licensing System (ULS) application filing system.

The ULS application filing system was not functioning properly last week and then the FCC indicated the problem was resolved, as previously reported by ARRL.

However, this was not the case, as no new amateur radio call signs and licenses have been issued since Monday, April 18, 2022.

Tuesday, April 19 is the day the FCC application fees became effective for amateur radio.

ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, reports that new call signs are not being assigned by the FCC even if the applicant has paid the FCC application fee.

The FCC was processing upgrade applications through the system without an issue because there are no fees required for those applications.

In addition to new call signs not being issued even if the applicant has paid the FCC fee, some applicants are also having issues paying and logging into the system.

It is not known whether or not the problem has been resolved as of 5-May.

The ARRL Programs and Services Committee, with guidance from the Contest Advisory Committee, has approved this rule change in response to the survey that was sent to participants of ARRL VHF contests late last year. Orlando HamCation® reported attendance of over 19,000 people for its 2022 event held in February.
